Families in various cities in our host country have received many relatives already. This is the new normal as Alliance national churches and international workers serve among the thousands of displaced people fleeing their home communities due to danger or violence.

A friend of ours, Elizabeth, received such a call from an Alliance pastor my husband and I have known through our Bible school ministry. At first, she told the pastor that she could not take in any more children. The pastor called again, desperate. Elizabeth still refused. He then sent an intermediary to see if that would help. In the end, our friend agreed. The 12-year-old, Grace, came with only the clothes on her back. Her dad is a pastor, and the family was chased from

their village about nine months ago. Grace recounted a harrowing story of fleeing their village, sleeping outside surrounded by many other displaced people and, of course, waiting to see if food would be found.

Grace is just one of the many displaced children who are living in the country where our team serves. Isaiah 16:2 compares displaced women to birds pushed from their nests. Their plight is not only desperate for them but also for their children, who, a few months before, had been playing, laughing, and going to school. But Isaiah goes on to say that one day, God will establish His King, and He will rule with mercy and truth. Pray that until that day, He will use us in helping the displaced among us find hope in Jesus. Intercede as well for protection for those in need of shelter, for wisdom in knowing how to help, and for finances to meet the overwhelming needs. Pray, too, for Grace as we enroll her in our Christian school and assist the family that is helping her.
